
About W.D. Howells

William Dean Howells

One of the most influential literary figures of nineteenth-century America, William Dean Howells (1837-1920) rose to prominence as editor of the *Atlantic Monthly* (1871-1881), becom-

ing one of the foremost proponents of literary realism.

While writing the "Editor's Study" (1886-1892) and "Editor's Easy Chair" (1899-1909) for *Harper's New Monthly Magazine* and occasional pieces for *The North American Review*, Howells championed the work of many



Although he wrote over a hundred books in various genres, including novels, poems, literary criticism, plays, memoirs, and travel narratives, Howells is best known today for his realistic fiction, including *A Modern Instance* (1881), on the then-new topic of the social consequences of divorce; *The Rise of Silas Lapham* (1885), his best-known work and one of the first novels to study the American businessman; and *A Hazard of New Fortunes* (1890), an exploration of cosmopolitan life in New York City.

Howells was elected the first president of the American Academy of Arts and Letters in 1908, which instituted its Howells Medal for Fiction in 1925. He died of pneumonia on 11 May 1920.
